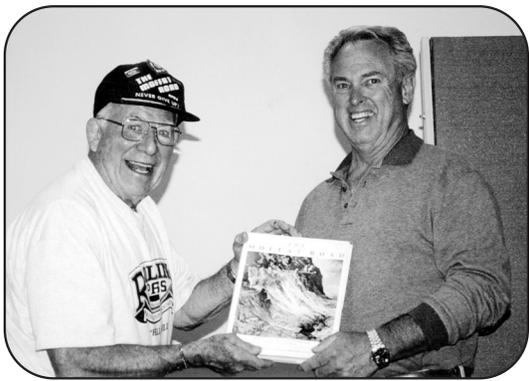




THE DREAM KEEPER

The area was filled with the sound of railroad memories. Las year Warren and Helen Donahue brought a railroad bell on top of their pickup. What a thrill! We had a number of attendees get to pull the rope. Others held their ears. Harvey Radke came from Wisconsin with real cheese. Clyde Brehm came by AMTRAC into Denver from California and brought Joe Lumphur along. The companionship, weather and food were outstanding. It would be impossible to list the dishes that were placed on the tables to share. 3. On September 14 Nita and I drove back up to Winter Park to attend the Great Outdoors Colorado, Colorado State Trails Symposium, at the Iron Horse Resort. The recreational trails grant program has been expanded to include Off-Highway Vehicle Grants. I was invited to attend by Gene King, Land Use Chairman, of the Colorado Association of 4-Wheel Drive Clubs. On Saturday, Nita attended the grant information program while I presented my program on Rollins Pass and the Moffat Road to another group. It was well received and following the presentation many went up the pass with bicycles and hiking plans. I gave them copies of our Tour Guides. The Moffat Road qualifies as an Off Highway Vehicle Road. RPRRA CAN APPLY FOR A GRANT. After reading the material; with three counties, the Forest Service, and the Colorado Historic Society involved we must apply for a grant. We have contacts with cities, Chambers of Commerce, newspapers and many others who can write on our behalf. I can also add that the Amendment offered by U.S. Representative Scott McInnis to the James Peak Wilderness proposal by U.S. Representative Mark Udall includes the provision of technical assistance and cooperation in repairing the Rollins Pass road sufficiently to allow two-wheel drive vehicles to travel between Colorado State Highway 119 and U.S. Highway 40. 
